When D.G. Wilson-Davis, executive director of Spirit of Hope, Cancer Survivors Making A Difference, was diagnosed with breast cancer in 1991, her first thought was "I don't have cancer, cancer has me." She rebuked it and is presently joyfully celebrating her sixteenth year in remission. Wilson-Davis became a beacon of hope for other victors - not victims - of the "Big C." In her endeavor to help others win their fight with the dreaded disease, she went on to find The Spirit of Hope organization, a unique cancer support service program uniting men and women diagnosed with cancer on the "Road To Recovery."

As survivors making a difference in Harlem, the organization exists under the umbrella of Cancer Support Services, Inc. that was founded by Jeff Berman in 1994 and continues to be the only non profit organization solely dedicated to improving the quality of life for cancer patients through exercise, nutritional counseling and stress reduction techniques. In the pursuit of making this a cancer free society, the consummate cancer survivor organization annually salutes Advocates of Hope in recognition of their self-empowerment techniques to become thriving cancer survivors.

This year's stellar Night of Hope benefit gala dinner dance took place at The Alhambra Ballroom

in Harlem and was attended by many local and national politicians, cancer survivors, community health care providers and civic leaders advocating comprehensive cancer care services. 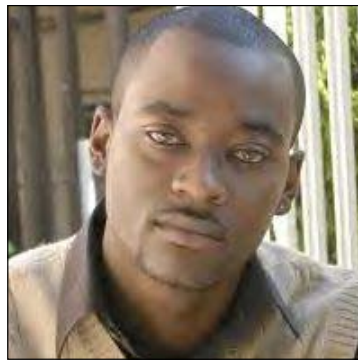

Assemblyman William Scarborough and NYS Committeewoman Joan Flowers, Esq. hosted a Free Breast Cancer and Prostate Cancer Screening Health Fair at the Pathmark Shopping Center on Saturday, Oct. 13th. Scarborough said these two cancer screenings were held because both breast cancer and prostate cancer have the highest death rates among African American men and women due to the lack of early screenings resulting in late stage cancer diagnosis. With early detection, both of these cancers have low fatality rates. The Queens Health Network Mo-

bile Mammogram Unit and the Arianna Prostate Cancer Screening Van provided the free screenings. Due to the large turnout of women requesting mammograms, Scarborough announced there would be another Breast Cancer Screening, provided by the Queens Health Network in November. Each mammogram takes 25 minutes, which limited the number of women who could be screened. Pre-registration is a requirement. Women who would like a free mammogram at the November screening should call Scarboroughs' District Office at 718-723-5412.

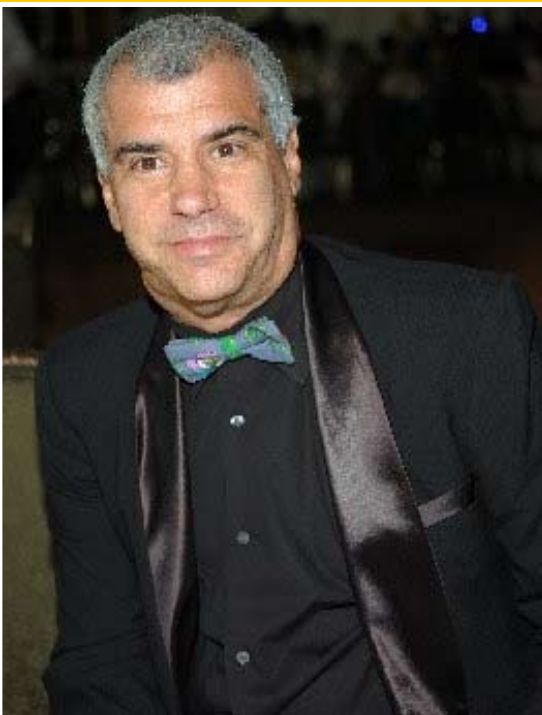
